Reporting Crimes and Emergencies

The Savannah College of Art and Design maintains an office of security, which operates 365 days a year, 24 hours a day. Criminal actions and all emergencies occurring at the university are to be reported to the SCAD security dispatch office at 345 Bull St., 912.525.4500. In Atlanta, contact the SCAD command security desk at 1600 Peachtree St., 404.253.3333. Urgent and life-threatening situations should immediately be called in to 911 in both Atlanta and Savannah. On-site staff members are also available to assist with emergencies. Residence halls are supervised by professional, full-time staff members who coordinate and provide assistance to residence hall students 24 hours a day for the duration of the contracted occupancy period.

In Lacoste, report crimes or incidents to the director of SCAD Lacoste at 33.(0)4.90.75.66.32 or the student services coordinator at 33.(0)4.90.75.66.33. Police may be reached by dialing 17, SAMU (ambulance) by dialing 15 and the fire department by dialing 18. In Hong Kong, report crimes or incidents to the student success adviser at 852.2253.8016. Police, ambulance and fire departments may be reached by dialing 999.

SCAD maintains a 24-hour on-call staff through the department of student success. Immediate assistance and follow-up reports are provided for students and other members of the SCAD community by the staff, in coordination with local health services and law enforcement agencies as needed.

All SCAD community members are encouraged to report all incidents, including sexual offenses. All reports are strictly confidential. Disciplinary actions for all violations follow the procedures used for disciplinary charges in accordance with SCAD policies. Incidents should be reported to SCAD security, 912.525.4500; the dean of students in Savannah, 912.525.6980; the SCAD command security desk in Atlanta, 404.253.3333; the dean of students in Atlanta, 404.253.3432; the Savannah-Chatham Metropolitan Police, 912.651.6675; or the Atlanta Police Department, 404.658.7054.

Timely Warnings

The SCAD security office works closely with law enforcement agencies to review current criminal activity and information in Savannah and Atlanta. In the event that a situation arises, either at the university or in the community, that (in the judgment of SCAD security) constitutes an ongoing or continuing threat, SCAD security will issue a university-wide warning. The warning will be issued through the SCAD email system to students, professors and staff, and posted on MySCAD.

SCAD also uses the Blackboard Connect emergency contact system to notify students, faculty and staff about emergency situations via email, phone and text message.

In Lacoste, the student services coordinator reviews security issues and

procedures. As new issues arise, announcements are made in the dining hall.

Emergency Response Evacuation Procedures

SCAD has an all-hazard Emergency Management Operations Plan in place. The plan outlines responsibilities and the use of SCAD resources in responding to an emergency situation. The plan includes instructions for SCAD officials to notify immediately all students, professors and staff in the event of an emergency incident, which includes a significant emergency or dangerous situation involving an immediate threat. For example, the issuance by the Chatham Emergency Management Agency of a mandatory hurricane evacuation for the downtown or historic portion of Savannah would trigger an immediate university-wide alert. SCAD communication vehicles include: Blackboard Connect, an immediate emergency text messaging system, MySCAD website and email system and messaging through the use of floor and building captains. Specific incident drills are conducted to evaluate training needs and the effectiveness of SCAD communications and incident response. The evacuation policy is published in the student handbook.

Evacuation Policies

SCAD follows all procedures regarding mandatory evacuations as instructed by the appropriate government agency (such as the Chatham Emergency Management Agency). SCAD buildings are closed during a mandatory evacuation period. Either the president or the chief operating officer of SCAD may authorize the closing of SCAD facilities or evacuation of the residence halls at his or her discretion prior to a mandatory evacuation order issued by a government emergency management agency. Notices of closing are announced on local television and radio, sent by SCAD email, Blackboard Connect, posted in the buildings and on the SCAD website, scad.edu.

Statistical Information

The SCAD security office is responsible for gathering statistics, identifying reportable crimes and publishing the statistics with the U.S. Department of Education. The SCAD security office works with the director of student conduct in the student success department, the SCAD security contractor, and local police departments to compile the annual security report statistics and information necessary to comply with the federal Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act. The information is provided to the Department of Education through its electronic filing system. It is printed and available at SCAD and is posted on the SCAD website. Notice of the posting, with the website link, is emailed to students, professors and staff, and posted on MySCAD. Notice is also disseminated through the Student Media Center.

Both the public logs and the printed annual security report are available at the SCAD security office, 345 Bull St., or by calling SCAD security at 912.525.4500. Annual security reports also are available at the office of the dean of students, 115 E. York St., 912.525.6980. In Atlanta, annual security reports are available at the residence life office in Spring House, 1470 Spring St., 404.253.3104, at the greeter's desk at 1600 Peachtree St., 404.253.2700, and at the SCAD command security desk at 1600 Peachtree St., 404.253.3333.

In Lacoste, statistical numbers about acts of crime are compiled by the student services coordinator.

Access to University and Academic Buildings

Access to academic buildings is reserved for students, professors and staff members. Members of the SCAD community must show a valid SCAD ID card to gain access to SCAD facilities. Students are required to renew their validation each quarter to gain access. All guests and visitors must be registered and escorted by a host member of the SCAD community. Registration forms are available in the offices of the residence directors. Access to each building is controlled by an access control system during their hours of operation and is staffed by security personnel during evening and weekend hours. Students may not use an unsupervised SCAD facility.

Barnard Village, Boundary Village, Dyson, Oglethorpe, Turner and Weston houses are staffed by SCAD security 24 hours a day, and residents receive keys to their respective rooms. Other residence halls (Forsyth, Pulaski houses and Turner Annex) remain locked 24 hours a day. Residents of these halls receive keys to the main entrance.

In Atlanta, Spring House has a guard in the booth at the entrance to the parking lot 24 hours a day. The ACA Residence Hall of SCAD is staffed by a security guard 24 hours a day. Residents receive keys to their respective rooms. All SCAD facilities are maintained according to federal, state and local codes to provide a safe environment for the university community.

In Lacoste, only students, faculty and staff are allowed in SCAD buildings. All buildings have locks. If the director of SCAD Lacoste feels the key or the code to a building has been compromised, then the director changes the lock or the code.

In Hong Kong, only students, professors and staff are allowed in SCAD buildings. All buildings have locks and we contract with a local security company to provide security officers in SCAD buildings.

SCAD Security

SCAD contracts with AlliedBarton in Savannah and Atlanta to provide security personnel who are trained to operate in accordance with state codes for unarmed security personnel and watchmen. Daily logs and incident reports are filed and reviewed. Incidents related to a criminal offense are reported to and handled by local law enforcement with the assistance of the SCAD security office. Violations of SCAD policies are referred to the dean of students for review and action. SCAD security personnel have no law enforcement authority and cannot make arrests, physically restrain or detain individuals; however, they may report criminal activity, summon assistance and act as witnesses. Students in Savannah can report criminal activity by calling the 24-hour SCAD security office at 912.525.4500 or, in the event of an emergency, 911. Students in Atlanta can report criminal activity by calling the 24-hour SCAD security office at 404.253.3333 or, in the event of an emergency, 911. Students in Savannah may also leave anonymous tips related to criminal activity or policy violations at 912.525.4545.

All incidents relating to criminal activity are reported through local law enforcement agencies. Through SCAD security, the university maintains a close, positive working relationship with local, state and federal law enforcement agencies through regular meetings and information sharing. In Lacoste, there are alarms and an alarm monitoring company for most SCAD buildings. The library, computer labs, gallery, office and hotel all have alarms and the alarms are monitored by a security service.

In Hong Kong, only students, professors and staff are allowed in SCAD buildings. All buildings have locks and we contract with a local security company to provide security officers in SCAD buildings.

Missing Student Policy and Procedure

Policy

SCAD takes student safety very seriously. To this end, the following policy and procedure has been developed in order to assist in locating student(s) living in on-campus, university-provided housing (residential students), who based on the facts and circumstances known to the university are determined to be missing. This policy is intended to comply with Section 488 of the Higher Education Act of 2008.

Most missing person reports in the university environment result from a student changing his or her routine without informing roommates and/or friends of the change. Anyone who believes a residential student to be missing should report their concern to security or student services/residence life to initiate a Report of a Potential Missing Person (RPMP). SCAD will act on each RPMP as set forth in the general procedures below, including an immediate investigation once a student has been determined to be missing for 24 hours.

Depending on the circumstances presented to university officials, parents of a missing student may be notified.

At the beginning of each academic year, residential students will be asked to provide, on a voluntary basis, emergency contact information in the event a student is reported missing while enrolled at SCAD. This emergency information will be kept in student services and is to be updated at the minimum of once per year.

Procedure

1. SCAD official receiving the RPMP will collect and document the following information at the time of the report:
 - a. The name and relationship of the person making the report.
 - b. The date, time and location the missing student was last seen.
 - c. The general routine or habits of the suspected missing student (e.g., visiting friends who live off-campus, working a job away from campus), including any recent changes in behavior or demeanor.
 - d. The missing student's cell phone number (if known by the reporter).
2. The SCAD official receiving the RPMP will contact the residence director on duty in order to update him or her on the situation and to receive additional consultation.
3. Upon receipt of an RPMP, SCAD may use any or all of the following resources to assist in locating the student.
 - a. Call the student's room
 - b. Go to the student's residence hall room
 - c. Talk to the student's RA, roommate and floor mates to see if anyone can confirm the missing student's whereabouts and/or confirm the date, time and location the student was last seen
 - d. Secure a current student ID photo or other photo of the student from a friend
 - e. Call and text the student's cell phone and call any other numbers on record
 - f. Send the student an email
 - g. Check locations mentioned by the parties above, as well as other areas commonly frequented by students such as the library, residence hall lounges, Student Center, Club SCAD, etc. A SCAD official may be asked to assist in order to expedite the search process.
 - h. Contact or call any other on-campus or off-campus friends or contacts that are made known. This could include checking a student's social networking sites such as MySpace, Facebook and Twitter.
 - i. Ascertain the student's car make, model and license plate number. A member of SCAD security will also check SCAD parking lots for the presence of the student's vehicle.
 - j. SCAD staff may be asked to obtain email logs in order to determine

the last login and/or access of the SCAD network.

4. If a student who is the subject of a RPMP is determined to be missing for 24 hours based on the information gathered by SCAD following this protocol, the university shall:
 - Notify the missing student's identified emergency contact.
 - Notify a student's parent or guardian if the student is under 18.
 - Notify the appropriate law enforcement officials in the event no contact information is supplied.
5. In addition, following consultation with the dean of students (or designee), SCAD staff may contact the local police to report the information.

Note: If in the course of gathering information as described above, foul play is evident or strongly indicated, the police can be contacted immediately.

Crime Prevention and Awareness Programs

Safety policies and procedures are published, distributed and discussed with all students, professors and staff at the beginning of each year, at new student and staff orientations throughout the year and in residence hall meetings throughout each quarter. In addition, the SCAD security office coordinates safety awareness programs for the university community each academic quarter. SCAD provides a series of crime prevention and awareness programs throughout the year. All students entering the university for the first time attend mandatory, quarterly first-year seminars to acquaint them with SCAD policies, procedures, services and resources.

Access Control, CCTV and Call Boxes

The SCAD security office has installed access control systems at many SCAD facilities that limit building access to authorized members of the SCAD community. Closed-circuit television systems have also been installed at many facilities. In Savannah, state-of-the-art call boxes are available to students, professors, staff, local residents and visitors throughout SCAD property.

Operation Chain Guard

The SCAD security office offers a bicycle registration program to all students. Owner and bicycle information is entered into the office's database, and a SCAD sticker containing a unique number is placed on the bike. This system provides a means to return lost or stolen bicycles, if they are recovered, to their rightful owners. Students can bring their bicycles and register them at any time at the SCAD security office, 345 Bull St., in Savannah, or at the SCAD command security desk, 1600 Peachtree St., in Atlanta. This is an ongoing program.

Rape Aggression Defense Systems

The SCAD security office offers a nationally certified women's self-defense course called Rape Aggression Defense Systems. For more information about the R.A.D. Systems, visit rad-systems.com or call 912.525.4500.

Safety at SCAD

Safety at SCAD presentations in Atlanta and Savannah introduce students to the issues and community responsibilities of crime prevention. The presentations are given by SCAD staff, local law enforcement agencies and representatives from other organizations. The presentations inform students of the university's sexual assault prevention and support programs and information and are open to any member of the SCAD community. In addition, special presentations are made when requested by student groups and clubs. These presentations are offered each quarter and are scheduled to accommodate

the approximate number of incoming students.

Safety Escorts

The SCAD security office offers evening and late-night safety escorts to students, professors and staff from SCAD facilities to their vehicles in adjacent SCAD parking lots or public parking areas immediately adjacent to SCAD facilities.

Lacoste and Hong Kong

The director of SCAD Lacoste and the student services coordinator talk to students during the initial orientation about procedures for personal safety and how to handle security problems. If there are incidents, staff make announcements at meal times.

Off-campus Organizations

SCAD does not recognize any off-campus student organizations. Any SCAD organization sponsoring an activity at an off-campus location must comply with the guidelines established for student organizations.

Alcohol and Drug Policies

SCAD prohibits the unlawful possession, use, manufacture, distribution or dispensing of alcohol or controlled substances by students or employees in SCAD buildings, on grounds or property, or as part of any SCAD activity. Any full- or part-time student or employee found to be in violation of this policy is subject to disciplinary action in accordance with the policies and laws of the university, the city, the county, the state and federal government.

A SCAD student who violates the university's drug and alcohol policy will be subject to sanctions. Disciplinary action includes, but is not limited to, warnings, probation, suspensions and expulsion or referral for prosecution and/or the completion of a substance abuse assistance or rehabilitation program specified by SCAD at the expense of the student.

Drug and Alcohol Abuse Programs

SCAD has an established substance abuse education program and a substance abuse counselor. SCAD may require, as part of disciplinary action, that the student receive treatment by a designated SCAD professional. Failure to comply with the university's requirements is justification for immediate dismissal from SCAD.

Sexual Assault Policy

SCAD recognizes that sexual harassment and sexual assault undermine individual growth and self-esteem. SCAD informs students about sexual assault through seminars and through the efforts of the office of counseling and student support services and its coordinator of risk awareness/prevention. SCAD investigates reports of sexual harassment and sexual assault; adjudicates them according to the policies and laws of the university, the cities of Atlanta and Savannah, the state of Georgia and the federal government; supports survivors of sexual harassment and sexual assault; and, when appropriate, informs the SCAD community of such instances.

SCAD affirms its commitment to ensuring an environment for all members of the SCAD community that is safe, fair, humane and respectful. Behaviors that inappropriately assert sexuality or gender as relevant to performance are damaging to this environment. Sexual harassment, discrimination or assault by any member of the SCAD community is not tolerated.

In the event of a report of sexual harassment or assault, student services staff advise students, faculty and staff of their options and support them in their decisions; however, in the event of an imminent threat to the safety of the SCAD community, SCAD proceeds without consent to protect the safety and well-being of all and prosecute offenders to the fullest extent of the law.

Victims have the right to privacy and confidentiality. In most circumstances, the university does not release a victim's name; however, in the event a victim decides to file a complaint, the accused has a right to see the complaint.

This policy applies to all members of the SCAD community—students, professors, staff and administrators. Recognizing that both men and women are victims of sexual harassment and assault and may commit such offenses, this policy is gender-neutral and applies equally to men and women.

SCAD policies and definitions on sexual harassment and sexual assault are also available in the student handbook and through MySCAD.

Process for Reporting and Addressing Sexual Assault

Students should report a sexual assault as soon as possible so that essential support can be provided. Reporting the crime can help the student regain a sense of personal power and control and can also help to ensure the safety of other potential victims. Confidential reports can be made to the dean of students, director of counseling and student support services, or to the office of SCAD security.

Students have the right to make a criminal report to the police department having jurisdiction over the incident, and SCAD officials assist the student in making that report.

A counselor from counseling and student support services, 912.525.6971 (call 912.525.4500 after hours to speak to a counselor) or the rape crisis center, 912.233.7273 in Savannah and 404.377.1428 in Atlanta, should be contacted to provide additional confidential support. The rape crisis center provides advocacy in accompanying students throughout the court system.

In Lacoste, students should report or address a sexual assault to the director of SCAD Lacoste, 33.(0)4.90.75.66.32, or the student services coordinator, 33.(0)4.90.75.66.33. In Hong Kong, students should report or address a sexual assault to the student success adviser at 852.2253.8016.

Medical Attention/Preserving Evidence

It is important that the victim seek medical attention even if the victim does not report the assault to the police. A medical exam is needed to check for sexually transmitted diseases, infections, injuries or pregnancy. A test for "rape drugs" may also be requested, since evidence of these drugs leaves the body within two to 48 hours. It is important that the victim not bathe, shower, brush teeth, use mouthwash, comb hair, wash or dispose of clothing, or take other actions to clean up before going to the hospital. Physical evidence should be collected as soon as possible following the assault.

Victims have the right to:

- Be treated with respect by anyone handling the sexual assault case
- Be interviewed by a same-sex police officer if requested
- Report the crime and not prosecute
- Reasonable prosecution by the law
- Withdraw testimony against the attacker at any time

- Decide whether or not to seek medical treatment (however, medical treatment is strongly encouraged)
- Request that a same-sex physician or personal physician perform the examination
- Change his/her mind and refuse treatment
- Exclude law enforcement officers from the examining room
- Receive confidential counseling

Counseling and student support services, 912.525.6971, may serve as a liaison between students, professors and the dean of students to make necessary academic and/or housing accommodations. Transportation is available to help students access ongoing counseling/medical appointments. After hours, students may contact the SCAD security office at 912.525.4500 to be connected to the on-call counselor. Similar support is available at SCAD Atlanta. Students may contact security at 404.253.3333 and ask to be connected to the on-call counselor. Lacoste students are connected to the on-call counselor in Atlanta and Hong Kong students are connected to the on-call counselor in Savannah.

Student-to-Student Sexual Assault

A victim of sexual assault by another student, in addition to contacting local law enforcement, has the right to notify a SCAD official. That information is forwarded to the dean of students.

1. The dean of students investigates the charge. During the investigation, the victim may request a new housing assignment (if applicable) and receive extensions of academic requirement deadlines. Requests are granted whenever possible. When the safety of the person reporting is at risk, restrictions are placed on the alleged perpetrator.
2. A hearing is scheduled in accordance with the Code of Student Conduct. (See definition in the student handbook.)
3. Both the accused and accuser are informed of the outcome of the hearing and the action(s) taken.
4. Students found responsible for, or who admit responsibility to, harassment or unwanted sexual contact (which includes, but is not limited to, fondling and/or penetration) are subject to probation, suspension or expulsion. Additional sanctions may be combined with those stated above.

Sex Crimes Prevention Act

The Campus Sex Crimes Prevention Act is a federal law enacted in 2000 that calls for tracking convicted sex offenders enrolled at or employed by institutions of higher education. The act amends the Jacob Wetterling Crimes Against Children and Sexually Violent Offender Registration Act to require sex offenders, who are already required to register in a state, to provide notice as required under state law to each institution of higher education in the state at which the offender is employed, carries on a vocation or is a student. State procedures ensure that this registration information is promptly made available to law enforcement agencies with jurisdiction where the institutions of higher education are located and that it is entered into appropriate state records or data systems. These changes took effect Oct. 28, 2002. These requirements are tied to state eligibility for certain types of federal grant funding and must be implemented through state law. The act also amends the Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act to require institutions of higher education to issue a statement, in addition to other disclosures required under that act, advising the university community of where to obtain information provided by a state concerning registered sex offenders. Information regarding registered sex offenders required to provide notice in connection with the SCAD Campus Sex Crimes Prevention Act can be obtained by contacting

the Chatham County Sheriff's Department in Savannah at 912.652.7624 or the Fulton County Sheriff's Office in Atlanta at 404.853.2155. In the state of Georgia, additional information about registered sex offenders may be found through the Georgia Bureau of Investigation Sex Offender Search website at gbi.georgia.org.

The Clery Act

The Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act, part of the Higher Education Act, is a federal law that requires colleges and universities to disclose certain timely and annual information about campus crime and security policies. Schools have to publish annual reports. Each school must disclose crime statistics for the campus, public areas that are accessible from and immediately adjacent to a college facility used by students or employees, and certain non-campus facilities.

On-campus

Any building or property owned or controlled by an institution within the same reasonably contiguous geographic area and used by the institution in the direct support of, or in a manner related to, the institution's educational purposes; and any building or property that is within or reasonably contiguous to the locations mentioned in the first part of this definition, that is owned by the institution but controlled by another person, is frequently used by students and supports institutional purposes (such as a food or retail vendor). This definition includes all academic buildings, administrative buildings, residence halls and cafeterias. As SCAD is located within the historic portion of Savannah, it has no defined campus apart from the various buildings it owns or controls and uses in relation to its educational purposes.

Non-campus

Any building or property owned or controlled by a student organization that is officially recognized by the institution; or any building or property owned or controlled by an institution that is used in direct support of, or in relation to, the institution's educational purposes, is frequently used by students, and is not within the same reasonably contiguous geographic area of the institution.

Public Property

All public property, including thoroughfares, streets, sidewalks and parking facilities, that is within the campus, or immediately adjacent to and accessible from the campus. For SCAD, this includes city sidewalks and streets as well as public parks, including historic squares and Forsyth Park, which are visited by thousands of Savannah residents and tourists each day. While this expanded area of reporting has produced greater numbers in SCAD's statistical reporting, only a portion involves members of the SCAD community.

Where the Data Comes From

Crime data comes from SCAD security, the office of student conduct and local police agencies. Prior to June 2005, crime data for the Atlanta College of Art came from the Woodruff Arts Center. Crime data for Lacoste comes from the department of student services and local French authorities.

Campus Crime Statistics, Atlanta

The following criminal offenses and disciplinary actions were reported in the calendar year listed. None of the reported offenses indicated that the victim was selected on the basis of race, gender, religion, sexual orientation, ethnicity or disability.

Fire Safety Report

Important definitions

Fire: Fire: Any instance of open flame or other burning in a place not intended to contain the burning or in an uncontrolled manner.

Cause of fire: The factor or factors that give rise to a fire. The causal factor may be, but is not limited to, the result of an intentional or unintentional action, mechanical failure or act of nature.

Fire drill: A supervised practice of a mandatory evacuation of a building for a fire.

Fire-related injury: Any instance in which a person is injured as a result of a fire, including an injury sustained from a natural or accidental cause while involved in fire control, attempting rescue, or escaping from the dangers of the fire. The term "person" may include students, faculty, staff, visitors, fire-fighters, or any other individuals.

Fire-related death: Any instance in which a person

1. Is killed as a result of a fire, including death resulting from a natural or accidental cause while involved in fire control, attempting rescue, or escaping from the dangers of a fire; or
2. Dies within one year of injuries sustained as a result of the fire.

Fire safety system: Any mechanism or system related to the detection of a fire, the warning resulting from a fire, or the control of a fire. This system includes sprinkler systems or other fire extinguishing systems; fire detection devices; stand-alone smoke alarms; devices that alert one to the presence of a fire, such as alarms, bells, or strobe lights; smoke-control and reduction mechanisms; and fire doors and walls that reduce the spread of a fire.

Value of Property Damage: The estimated value of the loss of the structure and contents, in terms of the cost of replacement in like kind and quantity. This estimate should include contents damaged by fire, and related damages caused by smoke, water, and overhaul; however, it does not include indirect loss, such as business interruption.

Residence halls fire prevention information

Residence halls have smoke detectors, alarms and sprinkler systems installed as follows:

Barnard Village, Boundary Village, Turner House, Alice Hall, Pulaski and Forsyth House each have a wet sprinkler system with alarm. The Terrace, Weston House, Dyson House, Turner Annex, and Oglethorpe House each have smoke detectors with alarms. Oglethorpe House and Weston House have diners attached that are covered with suppressions systems over cooking appliances and a fire sprinkler system. There are smoke detectors in each student room as well as in common areas. All fire systems are monitored by Sonitrol, an outside alarm company. The fire department is notified of any fire alarm. Each floor in each residence hall (for those having common interior halls) is equipped with fire extinguishers. Fire alarm pull stations are located on each corridor of each hall. All fire extinguishers are inspected on a monthly basis with an outside fire company inspecting all fire extinguishers yearly. At the six-year mark, a fire extinguisher is taken out of service and replaced with a new extinguisher. Backflows and sprinkler pumps and systems are inspected yearly by an outside company, International Fire. Knox Boxes are located at the front of the residence halls to allow access by the fire department in the event of a fire. All detection devices are cleaned and inspected yearly by an outside contractor. Tampering with fire safety equipment or setting off a false alarm is against the law. Any person who sets off a false alarm, interferes with the operation of the alarm system, damages or

removes any part of the alarm system, fire extinguishers, smoke detectors, or exit signs is subject to disciplinary action.

Fire drills/safety education

Unannounced fire drills are conducted every academic quarter. All persons inside the residence hall during emergency drills are required to evacuate the building. Failure to evacuate the residence hall for any reason may result in disciplinary action. Fire safety literature is distributed in conjunction with fire drills. Fire drills are conducted with the fire department's assistance. In addition, the Savannah Fire Department inspects all residence halls in Savannah annually. Fire training is conducted every year for all resident assistants and residence directors. A live fire is built and fire extinguishers are expelled. The fire department takes an active role in the training.

Fire safety rules

Prohibited Items: While residence life reserves the right to make determinations about the appropriateness of items within the residence community, in general, students are prohibited from possessing and using the following items in the residence halls (as well as others set forth in the Student Handbook):

- Candles and incense
- Dangerous and/or other flammable chemicals
- Empty and/or displayed alcohol-related containers
- Fireworks and other explosives
- Household items that include but are not limited to: air conditioners, ceiling fans, halogen lamps, space heaters and other open-coil appliances, clothes washers and dryers, external antennas
- Kitchen appliances/items that include but are not limited to: individual microwaves and toasters (Note: these items are permitted in residence hall rooms that include full kitchen areas and Spring House), electric skilllets, George Foreman-style grilling machines, hot-air popcorn poppers, portable stove burners, non-thermostat controlled coffee makers, refrigerators larger than 4.4 cubic feet (Note: microwaves are permitted in Dyson, Oglethorpe, Turner and Weston Houses and Turner Annex only as part of the Microfridge unit rented through a SCAD-approved company. A maximum of one unit per double occupancy and two units per triple occupancy are permitted.)
- Non-U.L. approved power strip extension cords
- Pets (other than freshwater non-flesh eating fish in a 10-gallon or smaller aquarium, and approved service dogs)

Prohibited behavior: While residence life reserves the right to make additional determinations about the appropriateness of behavior within the residence community, in general, students are expected not to engage in the following conduct in the residence halls (as well as other activities set forth in the Student Handbook):

- Blocking, hanging, or attaching items to fire safety equipment (e.g., sprinklers, smoke detectors, emergency horns, fire strobe lights)
- Cooking in residence hall rooms and/or outside of approved kitchen areas
- Smoking (all residence halls are smoke free including student rooms)
- Tampering with and/or misuse of life safety equipment, including but not limited to: heat and smoke detectors, emergency/fire pull stations, extinguishers, hoses, exit signs, fire alarm system

Electrical Outlets: There are a limited number of electrical outlets in each room, and these may not be altered for any reason. No more than two appliances may be plugged into a double electrical outlet at any time. Only one U.L.-approved power-strip extension cord no longer than six feet with built-in circuit breakers is allowed per resident. These are the only type of extension cords allowed in the residence halls.

Fire evacuation procedures

In the event of a fire, all residence hall buildings will be evacuated to protect the health and safety of the residents, guests and visitors. When an alarm is sounded you must assume there is an emergency and follow the following steps.

1. Evacuate by the nearest safety exit stairway.
2. Do not use elevators.
3. After departing the hall, proceed directly to the designated assembly point away from the building. Do not leave the assembly area until told to do so by a SCAD official.
4. Return to the hall only when told by fire department officials or a SCAD official.

Future plans

The university's future improvements in fire safety for on-campus housing facilities include continuing education of students, professors and staff concerning fire safety and prevention.

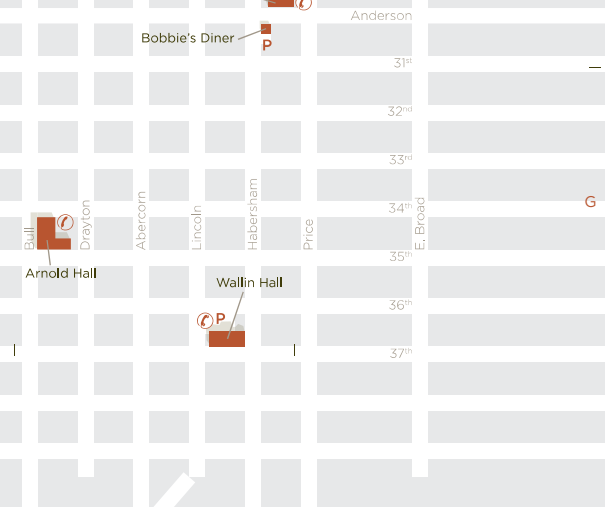
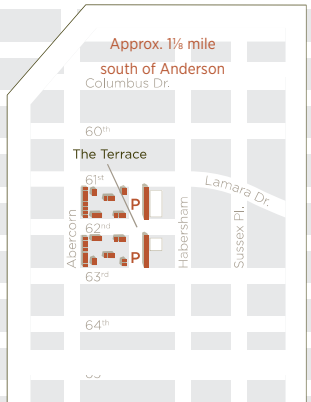
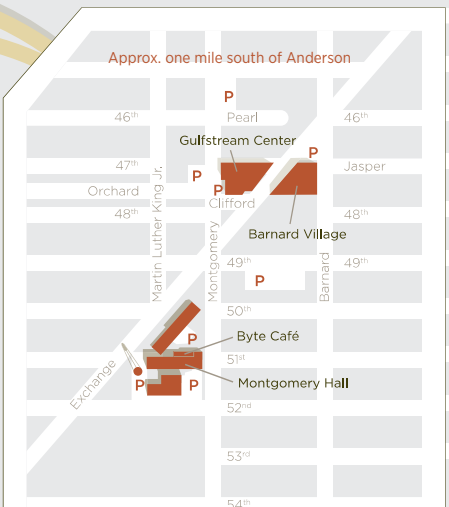
